STOPOVER IN GERMANY

Our time in Germany was both **intense and wonderful**. We visited family, friends and the church, enjoyed game nights, made plans and reflected on our time in Venezuela. Even before leaving Venezuela, we had **researched** online and **contacted various mission services**. After **praying to-**

gether, we received a clear "go" from God for a ministry in Africa. Then it was time to start preparations: gathering and sending documents, creating a new packing list and getting the things we were missing. On the 27.10.2025, after almost five weeks in Germany, we began our journey to Africa. After about 24 hours, we finally reached our new home for the next three months:

THE BASE IN KABWE

The organization ProChristo Global Missions Zambia (PGMZ) was **founded in 1998** and renamed OM Zambia after a **merger in 2009**. From the beginning, the base in Kabwe had the **goal of equipping local missionaries for worldwide service**. Thanks to their work, **80 missionaries** have already been sent to various regions of Zambia and other African countries.

Today, around **90 people work at the base** and support various projects, including a **safe house** for girls, a **school**, a **school for children with disabilities**, the **Sports Ministry** and numerous **outreach programs**.

Volunteers come regularly to support the work for shorter or longer periods of time – and now we are among them.

INSIGHTS INTO THE MINISTRIES

In recent weeks, we have been able to **visit five ministries** outside the base that are particularly concerned with **helping people in need**:

- Mercy House is located in Makululu, one of the largest slums in sub-Saharan Africa, with over 215,000 people living in very basic conditions in mud or brick huts. At Mercy House, children receive lessons, can do their homework, learn gardening and vegetable growing and take part in sports activities. Everything is embedded in devotion and prayer and they receive a warm meal, which for many is the only one of the day.
- **Bethesda** is a **school** for 50–60 **children with various disabilities**. In the mornings, the children receive lessons, followed by targeted movement therapies in the afternoons.
- Tabitha is aimed primarily at women, but also at a few men. Over the course of a year, they learn practical skills such as sewing, housekeeping and handicrafts so that they can earn money later on.
- The **Makwati School** teaches 360 **children from very poor neighborhoods**. In addition to a better education, they receive **two hot meals a day**. Due to high demand, there is even a waiting list.
- Hope on the Streets for Children offers a day program for 24 street boys in Makululu. The day begins with devotions, followed by math and English lessons, sports activities, time for washing and a communal lunch.

Each of these services demonstrates how **diverse mission** work is here and how much **children**, young people and families benefit from it.

TYPICAL ZAMBIA

- **Nshima** is the **national dish** and is made from **cornmeal** into a porridge that is traditionally **eaten with the hands**. It is usually served with meat, beans, fish or vegetables. It reminds us a lot of Venezuela, even though it is not fried here.
- Languages: In Zambia, there are around **70 other official languages besides English**, a remnant of the colonial era. In our region, **Bemba** is mainly spoken and in general, you can communicate with people almost everywhere using Bemba or Nyanja. From now on, the headlines will also be in Bemba:)
- Supplies: Similar to Margarita, there are frequent supply shortages here. Fortunately, we have running water at the base thanks to a groundwater pump. The power currently goes out almost every evening or even in the afternoon and comes back on at night, which is normal here. Thanks to a solar system, whose batteries are currently being replaced, we should soon have a reliable power supply. The internet is also not always reliable but that's not a problem for us, as it gives us more opportunity to play board games.
- Chitenge is a colorful printed cloth that women wear as skirts or use to carry their children or shopping on their backs.
- Zambia has **three seasons** hot season, cold season, and rain season. We are currently in the **rain season**, which we personally find very pleasant.
