### HERE'S WHAT THE NEW BOYS SAID:

“...learning new ideas, hoping to know more about God.”

“...how he will go and clean himself after a long day, hoping for a bright future so he can be a role model to other children.”

“...when he will be allowed to go to class, assisted to learn and succeed so he can help his family who is suffering.”

“...the meal he is going to have today, hoping to have a chance to complete school and help other children in need, that he will forget all the pain he has gone through.”

“... going to class – he's been out of school a long time.”

The kids are sometimes fearful when they first come. They're afraid of rejection. Will they be accepted? Will they find a friend? Will their needs be met? There's uncertainty - it's a new environment and new people. They've learned not to trust. Rehabilitation takes time.

# HAPPY 3RD ANNIVERSARY, PASTOR NICHOLAS AND MAGGIE!

What a blessing to have Pastor Nicholas and Maggie at Challenge Farm! Before coming to the Farm, they both were involved in discipling children, teens, and young adults, especially on how to read through the Bible.

Pastor Nicholas was a Christian Union Fellowship leader in high school. While pursuing his university undergraduate work in India, he served as Pastorate for the Victory Fellowship International. He later served with the same fellowship in Kenya. Nicholas actively served with the ICC (International Christian Center) Prayer Ministry.

During University, Maggie was involved in prayer ministry and occasionally led worship. While pursuing her undergraduate degree, she also became actively involved in Victory Fellowship Int'l. She later served in Kenya's local branch. Maggie created a discipleship "community" for their 2 sons and 14 other boys and spent 3 years discipling the small group. She says, "When I look back and what the boys are today, I see the hand of God in their lives." Maggie actively served as a Group Leader for ICC's Leadership Forum.

In 2022, Pastor Nicholas and Maggie received a call to serve in Kitale. They began praying and seeking the Lord. During that time, Maggie recalls, "... in the process, the Lord reminded me of a prophecy I received back in my university days about being involved with the less fortunate. The exact picture replayed in my mind. It was a prophecy I had totally forgotten about. I'm talking of 24 years later... I felt in my spirit that God is speaking...from that day I gave myself to the mission field and moved to Challenge Farm – Kitale."
