We have a new mentorship program at the Farm. It started in July 2023 and is doing so well! We have 8 facilitators, 4 male and 4 female staff. Having the boys and girls meet separately in small groups allows them to be to be adequately ministered to. Maisha helps prepare the students for when they are transitioned back into their communities. The mentors carefully walk the students through topics: proper boy-girl relationships and how to remain pure as a Christian, saying no to premarital sex, peer pressure and its effects (positive and negative), and other relevant life issues that impact teens. The community students who attend our school also attend the Maisha Program. Please pray as we continue to develop this program to best equip and help the teens.

Psalm 82:3-4a

His dad died when he was young. His mom tried to provide for him, but life was too hard. He boarded a bus to Kitale town, hiding under the seats. Would it seem possible at age 9, that one day he would attend a National Polytechnic and pursue a course in Social Work and Community Development to help children who are like him? About 5 days later, another 9-year-old boy came to the Farm. He was abandoned at age 4. His father who was providing for him died. He and his friends went to the streets. Could he even dream of attending University one day?

His parents separated, and he and his siblings were left under their father's care. The family was very poor, he couldn't sustain them. A pre-teen, her older sister used to brew illegal beer to buy food for her younger siblings so they could survive. Their dreams were broken. 14 and 13 years old, today held enough for them to handle. Would they have enough food?

At age 6, he went to the streets to look for food. It's not known how long he was homeless. He broke his arm, and he walked around with it broken. What kind of dreams would a 6-year-old, who is homeless, have? Who would take care of him? Another homeless boy, age 10, was arrested during a police round-up of the "street kids". He already spent 6 years on the streets, sniffing glue to help numb his pain. He didn't know what his future would be. He lost his desire to dream years ago.

These are the stories of Dan, Ian, Linda, Charles, Francis, and Owen prior to coming to Challenge Farm. They recently joined National Polytechnic, a Medical Training College, and various Universities.
